Still Life

I don't like paintings with fruit...I don't like them one bit.

Art historians recently discovered five still lifes by famous artists. The paintings feature 20 different fruits: apple, apricot, banana, blackberry, blueberry, currants, fig, green grapes, kiwi, lemon, lime, melon, olive, orange, peach, pear, plum, quince, strawberry, and tangerine.

1. Each painting continues exactly four types of fruit and no fruit is used twice.
2. Magritte's painting contains both a quince and a tangerine.
3. Of Renoir's painting and Cezanne's painting, one contains the blackberry and the other the blueberry in some order.
4. Only Monet's painting contains two fruits that start with the same letter of the alphabet.
5. The banana and plum are not in the same painting. The peach and fig are not in the same painting.
6. The banana is in a painting somewhere to the right of the painting with the lemon.
7. The kiwi is somewhere to the right of the painting with the apricot, which is not the Cezanne painting.
8. The olive and the blueberry are not in adjacent paintings.
9. The painting with the apple is on one end, the painting with the orange is on the other.
10. The painting with the currants is immediately to the left of the painting with the melon and the green grapes, which was not the Van Gogh.
11. The painting with the peach is somewhere to the left of the painting with the pear, which is somewhere to the left of the painting with the plum.
12. The painting with the strawberry is immediately left of the painting with the fig, which is immediately left of the painting with the lime.
13. The plum and the apricot are not in adjacent paintings.



What the art historians do like (one bit?)

Hamburgers and Hot Dogs!

There are 4 families total, and clues 2 through 6 list all 16 individuals. One family had hamburgers only (clue 7), and everyone not in that family had at least one hot dog, so this is the family in clue 2. One had 4 hamburgers, another 3, another 2, and the last one had 1 hamburger. This must be the person in clue 23, and everyone else had 2-4 items. In one family, two people had hot dogs only, but this is not the family in clue 2 (above) or 4 (everyone had hamburgers and hot dogs). The family in clue 5 includes two individuals who had hamburgers and hot dogs, and one person who had four items (clue 20) who could not have had all hot dogs (clue 13), so this is not the family with two hot dog only eaters; the family in clue 3 is. Danny Thomas had a hamburger first, hot dog last and is not related to the archaeologist (clue 11), so he/she is not in the clue 2 family, clue 3 family, or clue 4 family; he/she is in the clue 5 family. Danny Palmer is related to the geologist and dermatologist, but neither had 4 items (clue 14). There is no way to make Palmers the families in clue 2 and clue 4, so they are the clue 3 family (and Danny is the janitor or hydrologist). Danny Dudley had a hot dog (clue 17), so the Finleys are the family in clue 2 and Dudleys the family in clue 4. Sam Finley had 1 hamburger (clue 10), and Danny Finley 2 hamburgers. Sam Dudley had 4 items (clue 20), so Chris is the archaeologist. Sam Thomas is the furrier and had 2 items. Chris Thomas had 4 items. Chris Finley had 4 hamburgers, so Leslie Finley had 3 hamburgers. Of the four Leslie's (clue 12), Leslie Finley can only be the nephrologist. Sam Palmer had 2 items, so Leslie Palmer did not, nor did Leslie Thomas (he/she had 3 items), so Leslie Dudley did. In the Palmer family, there must still be one person who had 4 items, and the remaining person had 3 items. This accounts for 40 of the 44 items, so Danny and Chris Dudley both had 2 items each. The dermatologist and hydrologist had the same number of items (clue 15) so they each had 3 items, making Sam Palmer the geologist, and Chris Palmer the janitor. Sam Palmer and the hydrologist must be the members of the Palmer family who had hot dogs only. Two members of the Palmer family had two hot dogs, and one had three. If everyone else, other than the Finleys, had one hot dog each, this would account for all 16 hot dogs. Only the biologist had the hot dog-hamburger combo (in that order) so Sam Thomas had hamburger-hot dog, as did Chris Dudley. Danny Dudley had a hot dog second, so he/she had hamburger-hot dog, and the biologist can only be Leslie Dudley. Chris Palmer had only one hot dog (above) and it was his/her first item, so he/she had hot dog-hamburger-hamburger-hamburger. Danny Thomas had hamburger-hamburger-hot dog. Sam Dudley did not have his one hot dog first (clue 20 and above), so he/she had it second (clue 4). Chris Thomas's one hot dog was not first, second or fourth, it was third. The entomologist had a hot dog second (clue 19), but is not a member of the Dudleys (clue 19), Finleys, or Palmers, the entomologist is one of the Thomases, and can only be Leslie. We have 3 people who had a hot dog third (the hydrologist, Chris Thomas, and Danny Thomas), and since no one else had a hot dog third (clue 16), the dermatologist's meal was hot dog-hot dog-hamburger. The meteorologist cannot be Chris Thomas (clue 21), he/she is Danny Thomas, and Chris is the immunologist. The paleontologist and cardiologist must be the two Dannys who do not have jobs assigned, and the cardiologist did not have a hamburger second (clue 22), so he/she is Danny Dudley, and the paleontologist Danny Finley. Danny Palmer is not the dermatologist (clue 14), he/she is the hydrologist and Leslie the dermatologist. The lexicologist is not Chris Finley (clue 22), he/she is Sam Dudley and Chris Finley is the ophthalmologist. In summary:

- Chris Dudley, archaeologist: hamburger hotdog
- Leslie Dudley, biologist: hotdog hamburger
- Danny Dudley, cardiologist: hamburger hotdog
- Leslie Palmer, dermatologist: hotdog hotdog hamburger
- Leslie Thomas, entomologist: hamburger hotdog hamburger
- Sam Thomas, furrier: hamburger hotdog
- Sam Palmer, geologist: hotdog hotdog
- Danny Palmer, hydrologist: hotdog hotdog hotdog
- Chris Thomas, immunologist: hamburger hamburger hotdog hamburger
- Chris Palmer, janitor: hotdog hamburger hamburger hamburger
- Sam Finley, keymaker: hamburger
- Sam Dudley, lexicologist: hamburger hotdog hamburger hamburger
- Danny Thomas, meteorologist: hamburger hamburger hotdog
- Leslie Finley, nephrologist: hamburger hamburger hamburger
- Chris Finley, ophthalmologist: hamburger hamburger hamburger hamburger
- Danny Finley, paleontologist: hamburger hamburger

The last clue refers to Sam Finley running off to get married into the Breese family. Samuel Finley Breese Morse was responsible for Morse Code, which suggests reading hamburgers as dots and hot dogs as dashes. Doing so gives (in occupation order) "*ANAGRAM OF BELUSHI.*" The only one-word anagram is **BLUEISH**.
